

PPW Work Around the State- Wicomico County

"After the school feeds the children breakfast, lunch, and sometimes dinner. What happens on the weekends to these children?" Wicomico County has one of the highest rates of food insecurity in the state. That's where the Adopt-A-Block's Mobile Food Pantry comes in.

PPW Mark Thompson is the Director of the Adopt-A-Block program. Every Friday, volunteers with Emmanuel Wesleyan's Adopt-A-Block Outreach program serve up smiles and backpacks to Wicomico County children. In these backpacks, you'll find a variety of snacks. These treats will help keep these kids fed through the weekend.

The goal of the program is to help decrease the rate of food insecurity in the lives of elementary school children and their families throughout the county. The emphasis this year will be our homeless population or what we call in Wicomico County (F.I.T. Families in Transition). "We are excited to be awarded the grant from the Wicomico County Partnership for Families and Children for the third year to provide much

needed food to our

children and their

families. We also are

grateful for the Maryland

Food Bank in providing the food," said Thompson.

But their work doesn't end here. Every other weekend, volunteers with Adopt-A-Block head out into the community and deliver food to families. "We go out every second and fourth Saturday of the month delivering door to door food to people."

On top of that, Adopt-A-Block has their own emergency food pantry and a closet full of clothes that people in need can access at any time.

PPW Spotlight- Meet Sheryl Morrison!

"I firmly believe that my job as a Pupil Personnel Worker is the best job in the school system" My name is Sheryl Morrison and I am a PPW with Charles County Public Schools. I became a PPW 17 years ago after working as a Special Education Teacher. My wish with obtaining this position was to remove as many barriers as I could to help students succeed and receive a quality education. Relationships and connections formed with students and families are vital to the success in this position.

Student and family support are the foundation of my beliefs. There are several interventions and programs which I put into place to assist our students. We start the year with an Attendance Spirit Week. We have mentor groups with boys and girls, which bring experiences and activities to our students. Holiday support and planning for our families often starts as early as late September.

My McKinney-Vento students have been fortunate to receive academic supports. This year we implemented an after-school tutoring program and we transport the kids home after the sessions.

I hope that I can continue to support our students and try to remove as many barriers that I can to allow them to experience a successful educational experience. PPWs cannot do this job alone.

In the News

What We Know about Vaccine Breakthrough Infections from the CDC:

- Vaccine breakthrough infections are expected. COVID-19 vaccines are effective at preventing most infections. However, like other vaccines, they are not 100% effective.
- Fully vaccinated people with a vaccine breakthrough infection are less likely to develop serious illness than those who are unvaccinated and get COVID-19.
- Even when fully vaccinated people develop symptoms, they tend to be less severe
- symptoms than in unvaccinated people. This means they are much less likely to be hospitalized or die than people who are not vaccinated.
- People who get vaccine breakthrough infections can be contagious.

Maryland Department of Human Services - Financial assistance may be available through the Maryland Department of Human Services. Contact your local social services office for more information and assistance.

Emergency Shelters and Transitional Housing - Program fees are often assessed on a sliding scale by organizations that provide emergency shelter and transitional housing. Contact a local organization for more information.

Subsidized and assisted low-income housing programs (like public housing, HUD housing, and section 8 housing) are open to people of limited income, although the exact limits vary. Learn more about subsidized and public housing.
